



Shorter days = shorter irrigation



As daylight hours decrease, the sun's intensity decreases along with the need for water. Cut back on irrigation each month as we move further into fall.

By the numbers: If you're still using your summer irrigation schedu' it back now. Although autumn weather can be warm, evening tempers drop rapidly—decreasing the need for water.

Fall is the time for water-wise plants




As the drought continues, consider transforming your thirsty grass into a beautiful, water-wise landscape.


