Rovember of even numbered years (the same as Congressional elections)




The Board appoints a chief executive officer, the General Manager, who works for the Board and appoints all other staff

#### A Message from the General Manager

Dublin San Ramon Services District (DSRSD) is pleased to present the 2023 Annual Water Quality Report to provide our customers with important information about their potable (drinking) water. DSRSD purchases all of its potable water from Tri-Valley wholesaler Zone 7 Water Agency (Zone 7). The results of the water quality monitoring performed by Zone 7 and DSRSD confirm water delivered to customers met or exceeded all state and federal standards in 2023.

#### Addressing forever chemicals in the water

Per- and polyfluoroalkyl substances (PFAS) are a group of manmade chemicals that have been used extensively since the 1940s to make consumer products waterproof, stain-resistant, or nonstick. Recognizing that PFAS are contaminants of emerging concern in drinking water the LLS. Environmental Protection. livered to our customers complies with the new regulatory limits for PFAS. #### Conservation as a way of life

Over the past several years Californians have come to expect extreme shifts in weather, moving from severe drought to historic wet weather events almost overnight. It is more crucial than ever that we work together to reduce water waste and save water for future droughts. DSRSD customers are eligible to apply for water-saving rebates through Zone 7 at www.dsrsd.com/rebates.



#### **DSRSD's Regional Wastewater Treatment Facility:**

- Treats an average flow of ~ 12 million gallons per day
- "Minimum" 85% removal of particulate matter and oxygen consuming constituents



- Methane gas is a byproduct of the treatment process
- 96% of power required for treatment plant is generated onsite by this biogas





### **Recycled Water Program**

25 PERCENT OF DSRSD'S OVERALL WATER SUPPLY




3300 TONS OF INORGANIC NITROGEN DIVERTED AWAY FROM SF BAY

# **How We Set Water and Wastewater Rates**

- » Conduct a rate study every five years for each enterprise fund, looking ten years into the future and analyzing
  - > Revenue requirements
  - > Cost of services
  - > Legal parameters



### **How We Collect Rates**

- » Residential water rates are billed bimonthly
- » Residential wastewater rates are part of property tax bills
- » Commercial/Industrial water & wastewater rates are billed bimonthly

#### **How We Establish and Collect Fees**

- » Facility Master Plans identify future infrastructure needs
- » Capacity Reserve Fee studies calculate fee needed to fund infrastructure and debt service on earlier infrastructure



# **Strategic Planning**

- » District Adopts a Two-Year Operating Budget
- » District Adopts a Two-Year Capital Improvement Budget and Ten-Year Capital Improvement Plan
- » Ten-Year Financial Plans exist for both operations and capital improvements




### **DSRSD** Board of Directors



- » Five non-partisan members serve staggered four-year terms; elected November of even-numbered years
- » Each Director represents a Division within DSRSD's service area (five divisions)
- » Sets policies, appoints officers, and hires and oversees the General Manager
- » Exercises authority per Community Services District Law (CA GC Sec. 61000, et seq.)
- » Attends Board meetings twice a month, plus other meetings, events, trainings
- » Earns \$195 per day of service, maximum 10 service days per month





## Interested in Serving on the DSRSD Board of Directors?

- » Seats up for election in 2024: Divisions 1, 3, and 5
  - Division 1 is in Contra Costa; Divisions 3 & 5 are in Alameda
  - Seats are for a full four-year term
- » Eligibility requirements:
  - ➤ U.S. Citizen at least 18 years of age
  - Registered voter residing within the Division running to represent

- » File with your Division's county Registrar of Voters:
  - Filing period is <u>July 15 to August 9</u>. Extends to August 14 if the incumbent does not apply.











### **Treated Wastewater Disinfection and Disposal**



- Wastewater is disinfected (removal of pathogens)
- » Chemicals of concern are below discharge levels
- Final treated effluent is either recycled or pumped to San Francisco Bay
  - Recycled water DERWA
  - Effluent disposal LAVWMA and EBDA

### **Operating and Capital Funding Sources**





Water rates must cover cost to treat, store, and distribute water to customers

Local wastewater collection rates must cover cost to collect and transport
the wastewater

**Regional wastewater treatment rates** must cover cost to treat and dispose of cleaned wastewater



## Capital Expenditures Replacement & New Infrastructure

**Replacement** – funded by capacity reserve fees, interest and operating transfers from ratepayers


**Expansion** - funded by capacity reserve fees, other revenues and interest

### Bay Area Annual Water Charges (2023) Based on 8 CCF/month


